CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

At PanJam, we recognise that our long-term success is directly correlated to the well-being of the communities in which we operate and the environment as a whole.

INTERNATIONAL COASTAL CLEANUP DAY

Every year, the Jamaica Environment Trust organises an island-wide event geared towards building awareness of the need to protect our coasts. From the destruction of our coral reefs to the demolition of our forests, the short-sightedness of human actions continues to be a threat to Jamaica's natural environment. In 2018, PanJam partnered with Environmental Solutions Limited to collect more than 4,000 plastic bottles and other types of garbage from the shores of Port Royal. We are proud to support this annual activity that played a major role in the ban on single-use plastic bags, straws and polystyrene issued by the Government.



CORPORATE BLOOD DRIVE INITIATIVE

2018 marked the fourth anniversary of PanJam's initiative to highlight the importance of donating blood. Unfortunately, participation in our annual event resulted in the lowest collection rate since inception; only 26 pints of blood were collected for the National Blood Transfusion Service (Blood Bank). Even with this result, PanJam team members remain committed to this lifesaving venture. We have challenged ourselves to increase staff participation to 40% in 2019, and to encourage our neighbouring corporate families to help boost contributions of this crucial health resource.

READ ACROSS JAMAICA DAY

PanJam had another fun-filled year as part of Read Across Jamaica Day at the Boys' Town Infant and Primary School. Fifteen team members, along with four family members, spread the joy of reading to more than 250 students who thoroughly enjoyed the stories. We will continue to enthusiastically support this national event that uses reading books to children to stimulate their imaginations, while developing language and listening skills.



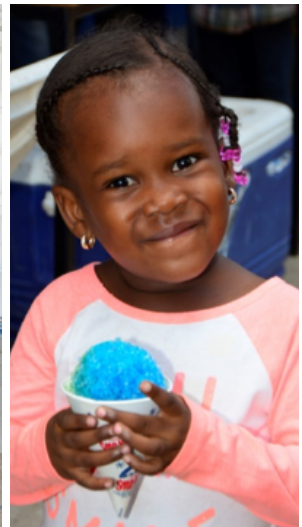
CAMP IGNITION

For the second year, students of the Boys' Town Infant and Primary School participated in a week of immersion learning dubbed Camp Ignition. In June 2018, 18 children, between four and 12 years old, were hosted at the New Generation Campsite in St. Ann. They benefited from sessions focused on social graces, conflict management, group and individual counselling, character education, visual and creative arts, grief management, play therapy, team building, sports, mathematics and literacy, as well as fun and adventure.

December marked our fifth annual Christmas Treat for students at the Boys' Town Infant and Primary School. The Treat has become a key calendar event for the PanJam team as we provide a day of activity, food and gifts to over 200 students. In the season of giving and spreading joy, the smiles on the children's faces tell us that we are doing something meaningful.

In 2018, we maintained our long-standing commitment to Boys' Town through PanJam's corporate social responsibility engagements and ongoing programmatic support. Of note, we launched the Boys' Town Family Care Centre, a unit focused on empowering and equipping new and expecting parents from neighbouring communities. We also continued our support of art, music and physical education programmes at the school, providing students with an opportunity to explore their creative talents.

In the last two years, the Foundation has reinforced its dedication to the conservation of Jamaica's natural environment through the formation of the Jamaica Conservation Partners (JCP); the mission of which is to support local entities and projects that focus on sustainable environmental development.

Looking ahead to 2019, we will increase our conservation efforts through the work of the JCP and the implementation of environmentally-friendly practices within PanJam's offices.

As Jamaica's education system adjusts to global changes in teaching and learning, we will reevaluate our current focus areas and determine the most effective ways to create social transformation for our youth.

The Foundation will also use sound financial practices to assist our legacy projects through the Maurice Facey Endowment Fund, as we are committed to enabling these organisations in the continuation of their critical work for many years to come.

Our annual grant process aims to fund projects that have potential for long-term, sustainable impacts on education, the arts and the environment. Every year, we receive an increasingly large number of high-quality applications and are heartened by the breadth of initiatives seeking support.

The Jamaica Conservation Partners (JCP), a project of the C.B. Facey Foundation, started in 2017 with a mandate to support entities and projects with a history of success, or with the potential to be successful, at promoting the conservation of our natural environment. These focus areas include fostering sustainable environmental development, facilitating capacity building among environmentalists, and advancing environmental advocacy and awareness. The founding Trustees are united by the shared belief that encouraging and enforcing the conservation of Jamaica's natural environment is essential to the sustained health and economic well-being of the Jamaican people.

Our first cohort of grantees includes Jamaica Environment Trust, Jamaica Conservation and Development Trust, White River Fish Sanctuary, CaribShare Biogas, Alligator Head Foundation and the Institute of Jamaica - Natural History Museum. By identifying and partnering with these local organisations, JCP will use its resources to actualise lasting positive environmental impacts.



BOYS' TOWN FAMILY CARE CENTRE

The Family Care Centre, conceptualised and brought to fruition by Dr. Christine Stennett, opened its doors at the Boys' Town Infant and Primary School in May 2018. As an extension of the Foundation's long-standing commitment to Boys' Town, it is expected to equip parents with the skills needed to better support children of all ages.

One mother of three, who joined in September 2018, is grateful for the programme, which has helped her in raising her youngest child. She also shares her learnings with other parents in the community, particularly those that relate to how to treat children and handle behavioural challenges.



WORTLEY HOME FOR GIRLS

Our legacy partnerships form the basis of our commitment to long-term sustainability in Jamaica. For over 30 years, the C.B. Facey Foundation has maintained its support of the Wortley Home for Girls. After the devastating fire in 2015, we facilitated the refurbishment of the Home's North Building, which houses the kitchen, dining room and laundry. The updated space is now used by 32 wards. We were pleased to witness the rededication and reopening of the Wortley Home in early 2018 and look forward to its many years ahead.



SCHOLARSHIPS

The Foundation invests in education and the arts through its relationships with the University of Technology Jamaica and the Edna Manley College for the Visual and Performing Arts.

For a second year, Neville Plummer, Sana Williams and Jheanine Wiggan received scholarships from the Foundation to complete their Masters of Architecture at the University of Technology. They were joined by first-time recipients and first-year Masters students Richard Thompson and Lisa-Gaye Chong-Baccas. From the Edna Manley College, Leanne Mair, Anthony Smith and Richard Gayle joined the ranks of the Foundation’s tertiary scholars. They were all guided on an architectural and art tour to hopefully inspire them to be pioneers of nation-building while preserving Jamaica’s culture.



IMPORTANCE OF ART FOR CHILDREN

We continue to encourage the use of art as a tool for children to express themselves. The Orange Hall Summer Camp - operating under the theme “Who am I, Embracing Others” - catered to over 40 students in the Walkerswood, Orange Hall, and Union communities. The participants were joined by two hearing-impaired children from Kingston who brought a refreshing perspective to valuing one’s sense of self.
